#### The Cochran Community House

The Cochran Community House is a beautiful old white building located near Middle Georgia College on Third Street in Cochran. In April 1938, the John Peacock family donated the lot for the Community house. The actual work on the structure began in October 1938, and was funded through the Work Projects Administration (WPA) of the Franklin D. Roosevelt Administration. The official opening of the building was held in June 1939.

The large stone fireplace in the main room was built of native rocks and stone from the Peacock farm, which were brought to the site by Mr. John B. Peacock, Jr. Some of the stone was also used on

the exterior of the building. The total cost of the building was \$11,000. The Cochran Woman's Club raised \$3,900 of that amount. In October 1939, the Cochran Rotarians paid the last \$100 payment of that debt. The Community House is maintained financially through rentals, funding from the city of Cochran, contributions from clubs and individuals, and of course, the Cochran Woman's Club.

Over the years, the community House has been the meeting place of numerous clubs and organizations. It has been the site of many church meetings, weddings, parties, receptions, and other social

functions and has also served as a polling place.

The Community House holds special meaning for many Cochran families as well as past and present Woman's Club members. In the words of past president Mrs. David Urquhart, we treasure "our Community House, the symbol of cooperative effort on the part of women who wanted a civic home of their own".

The Cochran Woman's Club acknowledges with grateful appreciation the assistance of Lonnie Bartow, Bleckley County Historian, in compiling the history of the Cochran Community House
